The Cajon Division Annual Banquet/Business Meeting/Railroad Night will be held on Saturday, February 28 at the historic Mission Inn in Riverside. Use the handy registration form on the inside back cover of this issue to reserve your place at what promises

to be quite a meal and evening. DO IT NOW.

For the mere all-inclusive price of \$11.50 for members and spouses (\$13.50 for non-PCR and for all at-the-door) you'll start your evening with a crisp tossed green salad and dressing. The entree is a New York Sirloin steak with stuffed-baked potatoe, vegetables, rolls, butter and a choice of coffee or tea. At no extra cost a Bavarian Mousse Dessert will be served to all. And remember, the \$11.50 includes tax and tip so the equivalent price of the meal, beverage and dessert is about \$9.40.

A 7:00 pm no-host cocktail hour will precede the 8:00 pm meal. We will have exclu-

sive use of the Galeria Room (second floor) for our evening's activities.

After the meal a short business meeting will be conducted. The Division's finances (we're in the money) will be shared with you as well as information on the coming Swap & Module Meet and the Santa Fe Barstow Yard Tour. But the big business news will be the

announcement of the election results and the installation of the new Superintendent and Chief Clerk/Paymaster. You'll probably recognize these two persons by their secondbiggest-in-the-room smiles. (The biggest smiles will be those of the out-going Super

Other highlights of the evening will include the showing of railroad films from Burlington Northern and Southern Pacific. The best two or three films will be shown from the titles, "Revolution On The Right-Of-Way," "High Green To Training," "Snow On The Run," "Portrait Of A Railroad," and "The Western Coal Connection."



Division Elections

Built mainly between 1880 and 1935, it is a nationally prominent landmark and is registered as both a National and State Historic Landmark. It's beds have seen Presidents McKinley, Harrison, Taft, Roosevelt, Hoover and Nixon as well as many of the Nation's most prominent industrialists and business leaders. Even the Boomers have paid day-rates here. (Just kidding, boys).

In addition to its history, the Mission Inn has many unique features, such as the St. Francis of Assisi Chapel (right next to the banquet room), plus a score of speciality shops (come early and brouse)

The Mission Inn is located at 3649
Seventh Street at the corner of Orange
Street in Riverside. Take the Riverside
Freeway (91) to the University offramp.
Turn west and go under the freeway to
Lemon Street. Turn right on Lemon and
then left at the next block (Seventh St.).
Public parking is available all around
the Mission Inn grounds. If you plan to
leave the wee railroaders with a sitter
the Inn's number is (714) 784-0300.

Don't miss this great evening. Your registration must be received by February 21 to qualify for the \$11.50 meal rate. At the door registrations will be limited to 10% of the pre-registered total and will cost two dollars more.

Swap & Module Meet Mar 28

The Division's third annual Swap & Module Meet will have a new home this year in the City of Redlands. The Saturday event will be held at Cope Jr. High School which is located at 1000 Cypress Avenue. To reach the site, head to the junction of Interstates 10 and 15E in the San Bernardino area. Head East on I 10 to Redlands and exit on Tennessee. Drive South on Tennessee for one mile. At this point the road veers left and becomes San Mateo Street. This street crosses Cypress Avenue about a half-mile further. Turn left on Cypress and you'll find the school just down the road.

The public will be admitted at 9:00 am until 4:30 pm. Module set-up and swap table set-up will begin at 7:45 am. Unlike prior years the swap tables will be protected from sun, rain and volcanic fallout.

As usual, the module layouts will be indoors except this year more space will be available. The size and number of modular layouts should exceed last year's turn out. Persons interested in displaying and operating their modules should contact Module Chairman Joe Walker at (714) 792-0405.

The Division's Dining Car will be in operation featuring a four star menu of food and drink. Besides the menu there should be plenty of donuts, coffee, and coke.

On a first-come basis a limited number of swap tables will be provided FREE. Only one space per seller can be granted. Otherwise you'll need to bring your own table and pay \$1.00 per card table-size space. At the insistance of the school officials only non-commercial sales will be allowed. Further, only strictly railroad items may be swapped or sold,

The admission price for both the swap meet and the module show will be a fifty-cent donation. Mark your calendar for Saturday, March 28 now as there will not be another ORDER BOARD published before this meet. See you in REDLANDS.

The press of business and my feelings that new blood keeps a division growing and vigorous forces me to resign at this time.



Riding The Rails

Editor's Note: Riding the rails or freight car hopping is illegal and not recommended

by your editor. This review is for information only.

"If Steve Echohawk needs to go to Ventura to see his parents or to Chicago to see a friend, he hops a freight train. Steve isn't a typical hobo though. At 26 he's currently finishing his bachelor's degree in psychology. But at least once a year he takes a major railroad trip without buying a ticket. He rides the empty boxcars on the freight trains. Countless yards and miles of track behind him make him a "professional" of sorts and he is sharing this expertise with others in seminar classes. There is a lot to learn before a student can become an accomplished rail rider.

"Part of it is becoming bilingual," Steve says. "You get as much as you know how to ask for." In other words, you've got to know who all the various railroad personnel are, what information they have and how willing they'll be to give it to you. You've got to know what to ask a herder, how to talk to the yard "bulls", how to find out if the train you're catching is a "hotshot" (a fast freight that you'll have to catch on the run, but one that only stops for crew changes), or whether it's a "peddler" (a slow train). And

you need to know where the train terminates.

You also need to know safety tips like how to get on and off the trains, what the cars are (gondolas, flatcars, piggybacks, reefers) and what equipment it's wise to bring. All this and more is covered by Steve in his seminars. He tells many stores and augments his information and tales with slides. The class lasts from 10 am to 7 pm with some time spent role-playing. For example, Steve plays the bull; you play the hobo. Freight hopping is illegal. When you're confronted it's very real, and you'd best know how to comport yourself. By rehearsing what you might say you're better prepared. You also rehearse typical conversations with other railroad personnel like the brakemen and herders.

At the end of the day Steve takes the class down to a railroad yard for a little "Hands-on" experience where you learn how to open a boxcar door, where not to touch the coupling between the cars, etc. - points of safety and maneuvers best suited to demonstration.

An excellent companion to Steve's course and interesting in its own right is the

An excellent companion to Steve's course and interesting in its own right is the Freighthopper's Manual for North America by Daniel Leen. (Capra Press, Santa Barbara, 1979) Freight-hopper Leen details the nuts and bolts of freight-hopping with seriousness - he's a professional and has lots of technical points to make - but he's also got good humor and a hardy streak of common sense. He advises treating railroad personnel with respect unless you're curious about what kind of food they serve in the local jail."
