A Note From An Old Operator BOB I

A couple of years ago I was sitting in my office in Hayward alongside the Southern Facific's Oakland - Niles - San Jose main line watching a long freight go by. It was apparently an auto parts train for the GM assembly plant at Warm Springs and consisted mainly of giant Grand Trunk, Chessie, DT&I, etc. parts cars when suddenly my eye was caught by something out of the ordinary. I couldn't quite place it. Then suddenly it hit me: a single door forty foot box car. In just twenty-five years the norm had become the exception.

During my high school years I lived in Tucson and spent all my spare time at the Tucson station or at the Park Avenue switch shanty. Espee was in the late stages of dieselizing its main line across the Southwest. Standard lashups of A-B-B-A F-7's powered most main line freights. E-7's in Daylight colors headed up the streamlined Golden State and Sunset. The Imperial and 43/44 were behind GS-4's or occasionally my favorite large SP engine the 4300 series Mountains with their skyline casings. From an action standpoint the workhorse Argonaut New Orleans - Los Angeles all stops, mail, express, baggage, sleeper, and coach train provided the most interest. Late each morning it arrived in Tucson behind a 4-8-4 which was cut out and replaced by a cab forward for the mountain haul via Dragoon, Cochise, and Lordsburg to El Paso. The 4-8-4 would go to the roundhouse for service and return west the next day on 43 which came west over the "Stormy" from El Paso. In between these two assignments the big engine would serve as protection for the westbound Golden State's diesels. No. 3 was due in Tucson about nine in the evening and off hand I can't recall a single case when the 4400 was needed.

What's the point of all this? Guess who took only a handful of pictures of perfectly matched sets of diesels and streamlined trains. Or for that matter forty foot box cars.

I wrote earlier of the progress the SP was making in dieselizing the Tuscon division during the early and midfifties. At this time branchline and local operations were still behind older steam. The daily Nogales freight and the Sahuarita turn would get a Consolidation or 2-10-2 depending on availability or tonnage. The South Line local to Douglas always rated one of the giant 5000 series 4-10-2's which by this time had had their third cylinder disconnected because of maintenance problems. Troop or "main" trains (it was the time of the Korean conflict) and grape specials were assigned Mountains or GS's either singly or double-headed. The east end of the main yard was worked by the 4503 and 0-8-0 which had been kit-bashed from one of SP's high-stepping Atlantics. Holding the boiler firmly, cut just outside of the last row of rivets, being careful. etc.



For you wee folk, we are pleased to present Phil Clark's N scale <u>Cargo Lines</u>. Diesel action-yards.

The Rocky Mountain Pacific R.R. is Terry Meyer's fully scenicked diesel powered heavy freight line. Terry's back-drops are exceptional.

George Breisch, owner-operator-engineer of the HO Apocalypse Southern R.R., will show you "Distend", "Dattend", and "Points" in between. Look out for Jabberjaws Curve- you could get hung up there all day. PFM sound, Fully (almost) scenicked.
