## " From the Brass Hat"

The work I set out to do when I was first elected has not been completed, so I'll be working with you to increase the benefits you get from being a member and increasing the membership. I'm hopeful that you have noticed and participated (or will participate) in the new programs, such as Modeler's Show and Tell at the live events, the Cajon Connection (which we will have as a live portion of the Spring event in April) and the new Layouts of the Cajon Division, which will have it's inaugural run February 18<sup>th</sup>, when you are invited to visit my N-Scale New York, Ontario and Western Railway.

One of the aspects of model railroading I really cherish is the generosity of time and knowledge of virtually every model railroader I have ever met! The project became way more complicated than I had anticipated, partially because I'm an electronics novice and I made the project more difficult with some of my design and component decisions. When I put out the word to my regular crew that I needed help with this project, a couple of the regular crew members generously spent time assisting me in a number of ways. ## **The Backshop**

#### The Golden Spike Award

The other day during the warmup before one of our operating sessions, the subject of the NMRA Achievement Program Golden Spike award requirements came up. We have several layouts being constructed within our group and I was caught a little off guard when asked for the specific requirements for the award. There used to be a really good explanation on the NMRA web site but it has been replaced with a link to the application form with little or no detailed explanation on the requirements.

Since most of our little group of operators are constructing layouts, I think it is safe to assume that many of our NMRA members are in a similar state of layout construction. With just a little guided effort, they/you can earn Golden Spikes as these layouts take shape and possibly long before they are completed. This includes module -based layouts.

In any case, I dug around and found the old, but still completely relevant, detailed description of the Golden Spike award requirements and they are quoted below.

## "1. Rolling Stock (Motive Power & Cars)Display six (6) units of rolling stock (Scratchbuilt, craftsman, or detailed commercial kits).

Notice that the requirement is to "display" them. Nowhere does it say that they must earn a minimum number of points in judging - just that they must be displayed. (In the monthly contests at your division meetings, for example. Even having them set out on your layout, or a table in your basement counts as "display").

These models need to show a little more effort than a "shake the box" kit. For example, by itself a freight car kit straight out of the box, is not enough to qualify. However, by painting and decaling it, adding a little detailing, perhaps some weathering, etc., you'll have a qualifying model in no time!

#### Model Railroad Setting (Structures & Scenery) Construct a minimum of eight (8) square feet of layout. (in any scale gb)

Again, there is no requirement about how good or how elaborate your layout must be - just that you must "construct" it. On the other hand, you may have trouble convincing someone that a loop of track nailed to a piece of green painted wood constitutes a "layout" . . . How much is 8 square feet of layout? Well, a typical module is 4 feet by 2 feet, and would easily satisfy this requirement.

## Construct five (5) structures (Scratchbuilt, craftsman, or detailed and commercial kits). These structures may be separate, or one or more of them may be part of a single scene.

The same comments apply here about the type of kits. The idea is to show that you can do more than glue a simple plastic kit together. Painting or weathering are good things to consider. Remember that "structures" aren't just buildings. Things like bridges and trestles also fall into this category.

#### Engineering (Civil & Electrical)

## Three (3) types of trackage are required (turnout, crossing, etc.). All must be properly ballasted and installed on proper roadbed. Commercial trackage may be used.

This requirement sounds a lot harder than it is. First, notice that last sentence about commercial trackage; you don't have to hand-lay anything - you can just install a store-bought turnout. "Types of trackage" can be just about anything: turnouts, crossings, and grade elevation (a change in elevation of the track) are all examples of "types of trackage". Also, note that the three types DO NOT have to be different. For example, just having three simple turnouts will qualify. The "proper roadbed" requirement can be met by laying the track on a raised roadbed, (such as cork) and ballasting it. The purpose of this requirement is to show that you understand roadbed profile, drainage, etc.

## All installed trackage must be properly wired so that two trains can be operated simultaneously (Double-track main, single-track main with sidings, block or command control, etc.). (DCC gb)

This requirement can also be easier than it sounds. Notice the option for a single track main with sidings. This means that as long as you can cut power to the sidings individually, you can run one train, park it on a siding while you run another, then park it and run the first again. This meets the requirement.

## Provide one additional electrical feature such as powered turnouts, signaling, turnout indication, lighted buildings, etc.

Don't read more into this than is there. A powered turnout can be something as simple as an Atlas turnout with a switch machine. Think in terms of anything that runs off the 'Accessories' terminals of a power pack and you 're half way there.

One other thing to remember: Not all of these requirements need to be met on the same layout (or piece of layout). They don't even need to be met in the same scale! If you want to build G scale rolling stock, an N scale Model Railroad setting, and an HO scale layout for trackage and wiring, go ahead.

Also, the Golden Spike, as well as the other parts of the AP have a certain amount of flexibility. For example, suppose you and your (friend / spouse / child) work together on all your projects, but do twice the required amount (12+ units of rolling stock, 16+ square feet of layout, 10+ structures, etc.). You can both be considered, as long as you can show that you have each demonstrated the required skills."

The NMRA and the Cajon Division are about learning from one another; and one of the ways we do that is through clinics presented by our fellow modelers at local events, regional events, and national conventions!

Clinics can be presented on almost any subject that might be of interest to other modelers, such as a scenery technique, model building, model painting, operations, layout planning, electronics, decoders, taking railroad photos, or historical rail subjects, among others. We all recognize that model railroading is many mini-hobbies wrapped up together: so which one of the mini-hobbies are you knowledgeable about and willing to share with the rest of us?

Your clinic could be a live demonstration of the technique (tree building for example) or a lecture done in Power Point. Clinics presented at Division events can help you qualify for either your Author or Volunteer AP Award, provided that your clinic is a minimum of 45 minutes in length and you distribute written materials to the modelers who attend your clinic.

## February 18, 2023, Saturday, 10am – 3pm, In-Person Layout Tour

**Tour-** Joel Morse is hosting a tour of his 150 square foot N-Scale layout based on the New York, Ontario and Western Railway and designed for operations.

Date- Saturday, February 18, 2023

Time- 10am-3pm

Location- 11891 Tunstall Street, Garden Grove, 92845

Masks- Optional if vaccinated. Please wear a mask if not.



**Access**- Garage layout – wheelchair accessible. Step up required for bathroom only.

Layout Elevation- 50 to 53"

Parking – Public Street and driveway.

**Layout Description:** This proto-lanced point to point layout models the NYOW main line through the rolling hills of New York's Catskill Mountains in the spring of 1954. Traffic consists of dairy products, coal, bluestone granite, farm products, produce, wood chemical products and a variety of manufactured goods. The layout goal is to

provide a combination of switching and through traffic focused jobs to the operating crews. The main yard and the wye connection to the Delhi Branch are in Walton, with trains serving customers located in the towns of Walton, Merrickville, Maywood, and Sidney on the NYOW. The layout includes an interchange with the Delaware and Hudson in Sidney, connection to the Delaware, Lackawanna & Western at Merrickville Junction, and interchange with the DL&W in Shellysburg. This E-shaped, folded dog-bone layout includes a 10-track staging yard representing the Division points of Cadosia and Norwich on the NYOW, a hidden track representing connection to the Delaware and Hudson Railroad and a 9-track staging yard representing the DL&W mainline at Binghamton and Syracuse. All this staging allows for the 7 operators to run a variety of train types, with a typical session handling 15 to 20 trains, including locals, turns, manifest freights, coal drags, interchange transfers and passenger trains; with traffic managed by the Dispatcher using a Train Sheet and issuing verbal Track Warrants. Crew jobs consist of Dispatcher, Walton Yard Master, Walton Assistant Yard Master, and four road crews. A first layer of scenery is completed over the entire layout, with detailed scenery treatments in progress all over the railroad. Structures include a combination of scratchbuilt, kit-bashed, kit built, and swap meet stand-ins.





### March 25, 2023, Saturday, 10am – 3pm, In-Person Layout Tour

**Tour**- Gary and Sandy Butts are hosting a tour of their home front-room based freelance Gary & Sandy Railroad HO scale layout.

Date- Saturday, March 25, 2023

Time- 10am-3pm

Location- 5991 Kenwick Circle, Huntington Beach, CA 92648

Masks- Optional if vaccinated. Please wear a mask if not.

Access- Front door, 2 porch steps up, 1 step down into the front room layout area.

Layout Elevation- 42" base, rising to 51"

Parking- Open access, cul-de-sac street and driveway.

**Layout-** Gary and Sandy have replaced their normal front room furniture with an 11' x 15' HO scale layout. The layout is HO standard gauge loosely placed in the late 1800's to early 1900's featuring all steam locomotive power with early automobiles and some horse drawn conveyance. The setting is rural mid-California with a couple of early dirtroad small towns and an elevated mine and logging area with log flume and lake. Originally constructed as a 4' x 8' plywood layout using a folded dog-bone style track plan with an elevated town for continuous running, the original layout was modified to allow bi-directional operation. Later layout expansion more than doubled the layout's size in a "U" shaped configuration. Essentially all structures and 95% of the rolling stock have come from scratch building and kit assembly. Regular operating sessions are held a couple of time each month usually featuring a dispatcher, three to four trains, and a yard master. On a smaller layout such as this, operations can be a challenge but a lot of fun.

## 2024 National Model Railroad Association Convention in Long Beach, CA! Aug. 4 to 11





The week-long *SurfLiner 2024* national convention is being hosted by the Pacific Southwest Region of the National Model Railroad Association and held at **The Westin in Long Beach, CA.** The convention features a variety of activities and events to enhance your knowledge of model railroading, prototype railroading and Southern California! These consist of hundreds of clinics, numerous prototype tours, layout tours, opera-



tion sessions, and general interest tours and activities, culminating in the NMRA Awards Banquet on August 10<sup>th</sup>. As a convention attendee you will get early, special access to the National Train Show<sup>®</sup>, where you will see the latest model railroading products, meet major manufacturers, and purchase items for your layout. Don't miss out on this incredible week of model railroading experiences!

**Layout Tours and Operations:** The Pacific Southwest Region has some excellent model railroad club and home layouts to visit. There will also be operations sessions which will give you an opportunity to run trains under the guidance of local model railroaders.
