Our Nevada team held a meet with the Scale Trains Road Show on July 22. The Nevada Fall Meet is scheduled for September 23, 2023, from 10:00 am to 5:00 pm at the Community Library in Las Vegas, NV. The Cajon Division is also hosting the Layouts of the Cajon Division. These are home model railroad tours presented by Cajon Division members. The July tour was the Union Pacific Overland Route, my own layout. The August Layout Tour was Chris Jean's Santa Ana and Newport Railroad. The September Layout Tour is the Oakhurst Railroad which is a garage-to-garden model railroad. This open house will be held at Marty Bradley's home in Rossmoor on September 16, 2023.

September 9 and 10, 2023, is the "Los Angeles Union Station Train Festival 2023: A Celebration of Past, Present & Future." The festival will feature railroad equipment, model train displays, as well as architecture, arts, and culture tours. Steam locomotive Santa Fe 3751, BNSF freight locomotive, Santa Fe 5704 painted in red, white, and blue for the 200th Anniversary of the United States, Amtrak passenger equipment, and a display of Metrolink equipment will be on display on the Union Station tracks. Model railroad modular clubs include the Orange County Module Railroaders, the Group 160 NTRAK Club, the Southern California traction club, the Southern California Z Scale Model Railroading Group, the Toy Train Operating Society, and the Train Collectors Association Western Division. Tours of the Union Station will be facilitated by the California Preservation Foundation and the Los Angeles Union Station Hidden Gems Tour. The Pacific Southwest Region of the NMRA will have a booth at the event to promote the next NMRA National Convention: SurfLiner 2024.

The 2023 NMRA National Convention is now over and the next National Convention, SurfLiner 2024 is the responsibility of our own Pacific Southwest Region. SurfLiner 2024 will be held at the Long Beach Convention Center August 4 through August 11, 2024, with the base operation at the Westin Hotel. The planning process for the convention is in progress and will be a joint effort of all four PSR Divisions. Please consider joining the SurfLiner 2024 Convention Team and contributing to the success of the 2024 NMRA National Convention.



Model Railroad Description:

The Oakhurst Railroad is a unique layout combining both an indoor HO scale doubled-deck railroad with an outdoor G-gauge railroad. The model railroad depicts this fictional logging and mining railroad running through the Sierra town of Oakhurst, California in the 1930's. While no real railroad ever ran through Oakhurst, the area is rich in logging and mining history, and famous railroads operated nearby. The double-deck HO layout is constructed inside a 9 x 11 office area walled off from the rest of the garage, with the scenery 100% "complete". In 2016, the garden railway was added in a major backyard reconstruction project. Today, the Oakhurst Railroad is a two-level, point-to-point railroad with a helix, an optional continuous run, and an operational "connection" to the outdoor garden railway. A complete round trip train run can be up to 5 scale miles.




Building the Rio Grande Southern Bridge 41A



I wanted to build a trestle to be considered for the Achievement Program "Master Builder – Structures" award. I knew that this would require some very intense and delicate work. Thinking "How can I start this major project" I decided to build a part of the trestle. Start small was my motto. Doing a bit of research, I found a Rio Grande Southern bridge (41A) that actually was similar to a part of the trestle I wanted to build (RGS Story Vol 3).

Here are the plans drawn for this model:

The first step after doing the plans and parts list is to stain the wood and paint the rails. I used Varathane Stain – Dark Walnut for the wood and Floquil Rust for the rails. It is important to stain the wood prior to any construction since glue seals the wood and prevents stain from sinking in.

After staining the wood and painting the rails, the parts need to be cut to length. It's easiest to use a chopper (with fresh single side razor blade) and add a "stop block" to ensure that each of the various sized wood pieces is the same. I used the plans to measure the correct sizes to cut. The rail cuts just need to be done carefully to cut them to the correct lengths.

Once the wood and rails are cut to size, touch up the stain at each end of the wood pieces and paint the ends of the rails.

Making an assembly jig isn't hard. Just cut up a copy of the plans (carefully as the lines count), and trace them onto styrene sheet. Next add small strips of $1/8^{th}$ inch x $1/8^{th}$ inch styrene as holders. One jig is needed to space the stringers the correct distance apart. This jig can also be used to assist in placing the crossties.

Glue two sets of three stringers (C) and let dry. The middle stringer of each of the two sets will sit directly under the rail. I used Aliphatic Resin Wood Glue.

Glue two Bulkhead pieces (D) onto the bulkhead base and let dry. Next, repeat and glue the other bulkhead together, letting it dry as well.

Glue the 16 crossties on the stringers. I used the photograph to space these crossties because some of them had shifted slightly. (I forgot to mention this on the grading sheet for the evaluation and got dinged for them not being evenly spaced.) Set this aside to dry.

The outside guardrail board (A) is added next. One guardrail board goes on each side of the crossties. See the plan above.

Since everything needs to dry, now is a good time to drill the bolt holes in the 33' rails. Using a twist drill

with a very small bit will take some time to drill the eight holes needed. Take your time. Touch up the shiny metal with "rust" paint.

This is a narrow gauge bridge so it's easy to use a piece of HOn3 track to gauge the rail placement over the stringers. The secret is to drill a very small pilot hole for each spike. Then spike it in. Do this individually for each spike. That way the rails stay in the correct alignment. I ran into a little problem as the spikes, even though the smallest I could get, were too long. This was judged accordingly, where too long spikes poked through. Note the bulkheads are not part of the assembly at this point. This part of the modelling takes a bit of time so settle in and be patient.

After you finish the rail portion of the bridge, it's time to do the guardrails. The guardrails are a scale 16' in length and by RGS design go on the outside of the stock rails. I place the guardrails as close as possible to the running rails. The spike heads need to fit between the guardrail and the stock rail.

Now you need to drill small holes in the wood guardrail and install bolt and washer detail. Use the photograph to see where they go!

Almost done. Now glue the bulkhead assemblies to each end of the bridge. Looks pretty good doesn't it?

Congratulations on constructing a bridge. If you took your time and followed these steps you've now created a bridge. In order to earn the Achievement Program Certificate for master Builder – Structures, you need a bridge model and you've just done it!

This model was entered in a Cajon Division "Celebrations of Models" and took first place and earned a "Merit Award." I was amazed as this model was a test bed for another more complex model. You never know until you try.

So, give it a try!
