

TOWER TALK by Vic Prior

We all have models that could not be replaced if a fire swept through our layout room or if we were the victim of a burglary. Some models that were very expensive to purchase may be replaceable, but those same model prices today are out of sight. The NMRA Executive Council is now working to provide insurance for your model railroads and models. An agreement is now being worked up with the Hartford Fireman's Fund. Details have to be worked out, but the cost will be a \$1 per hundred, with a minimum policy requirement, and a maximum loss payment of \$5000 on any one item. Administration has to be worked out. There will be more news on this later.

In an earlier Tower Talk, I mentioned that I was concerned about all of the special interest groups' national conventions and shows that seem to be happening all over the country these days. This activity has to have an impact on our own NMRA national Convention. Motions were made and passed by the Executive Committee for a policy statement that the NMRA would endorse only Divisional, Regional, National, HIA and MRIA sponsored model railroad shows. I'm still concerned because in the end, aren't we all interested in furthering the model railroad hobby as a whole? United, we stand a better chance to have an impact in the general publics eye, when they find we have just had 4-5000 people in town attending a convention than just a few hundred or so. Also, the manufacturers tend to hear better when something is demanded in unison by a large organization.

The Board of Trustees has continued the no frills membership category for two more years. The first year of the program brought in 308 new members. (??) The second year brought in 136. Interesting, isn't it? I wonder how many of those 444 new members would have joined under normal circumstances?—more than a few I believe.

The BOT discussed 27 motions in their meeting so I can't go into all of them, but MBOT 19 was a hot one. This had to do with a dues increase. There has been no increase since 1980 and we all know what inflation has done to us in the last three or four years. The motion was passed with 13 yes, 3 no and 1 abstention. The effective date will be early in 1985. Our financial condition demands an increase in dues as we are running into a defecit situation. If you have ever considered a life membership, do it now and save money. If you decide to go for the five year payment plan you will get the same rate if you start now before the dues increase.

A resolution terminating the NMRA Business Managers employment, effective immediately, was passed with 14 yes, 1 no and 2 abstentions.

Dave Kahler, San Diego Division Director, has initiated action to recombine the PSR and PCR into one region. As most of you know, I was opposed to the split from the start. Both the PSR and PCR Conventions this year have been second rate due to the split. It certainly isn't because the convention committees didn't work at putting on a good convention. There just weren't enough attendees to justify some of the activities that could have taken place. As one who has attended all the regional conventions for many years, the negative impact of the split has been very obvious. At any rate, this will be on the agenda at the directors meeting in Barstow this Fall. If you have any strong feelings about this subject, let me know about them. Until next Quarter, happy modeling.

OFFICERS NEEDED by Vic Prior

Do you care how the Cajon Division is operated? If you do, you should consider running for a Division office so that you too can have a say in the future of the Division. Bill Scholz' ATSF- 1970 ERA




