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



The most controversial issue, the reunification of the two Regions (the PSR and PCR) occupied a large part of the days Your representatives, for the most part, excersized restraint and exhibited wisdom by refusing to rush emotionally back into a combined Region.

The Board's decision was to study the issue, talk to the membership at large so much as possible, and decide what actions to take. The first two steps are the responsibility of a committee appointed by Region President Bob Rowe. The committe will report at the next PSR BOD meeting in Fresno in May. The Cajon Division is represented on the study committee by Ray Sadler, our Division Director. If you have any opinions in the matter, please give him a call.

One of the main points I heard during the boards discussion of this volatile issue was that the people who are the "workers" at the Regional and Divisional level are the same today as several years ago; that they (the workers) weren't for the split then and they aren't for remaining separated today. One of the reasons for the split was to allow for more people to work at the Regional and Divisional levels yet no new workers came out of the background. Where are the people who voted for the split? How much do they still want their own Region here in Southern California? Are they willing to come forward and help run the Region? There are twice as many jobs that need doing and only half the people available to help.

Over the next few months and year you'll be answering that question, and your stand on re-unification, by the way you volunteer to work for YOUR organization. I'd like to see all of you at the meets working for the growth of your Region and Division. I know that there are many available areas where your help is needed. #### TOWER TALK by Vic Prior

Todays kids are tomorrows model railroaders. If our ranks are not filled in from the younger generation, our hobby will expire from old age. We must do more to make model railroading visible to today younger generation. Railroads aren't as visible as they once were so self inspiration is not likely.

With more and more forms of activities competing for the entertainment dollar we have to show not only that it is an interesting hobby, but also that it is entertaining as well. This can be accomplished by simply letting them see what we have done. Surely a lot of relatives were over for the holidays. How many of you took the time to show the younger

ones you layout? You say its incomplete! Well whose isn't? All you have to do is lay down a section of flex track, attach power leads to it and run a locomotive back and forth on it, even if you forego that.

I can still remember my second day in model railroading. A friend took me to a local hobby shop and there, in the case, were all types of locomotives: Heislers, Pacifics, Mallets. That was it. I caught the fever and have ben running at about 103 degrees ever since.

Another course of action would be to take them to the several open houses that occur every month. Here they will see the hobby in its most dynamic sense. They will also be able to see the immense diversity within the hobby, whether it pertains to trains, scenery, structures or what have you.

If you do have an operating layout, why not let the youngsters try their hands at the throttle. There's no substitute for first hand experience. That is something that becomes important in adult life.

Model railroading also provides the youngster most of the essential thought process necessary to function in this world. How many of us out there fudged the books to justify the purchase of that brand new brass locomotive. Only the wives don't know for sure.


