The Las Vegas West Layout Tour began at the home of Kathy Rice and Richard Shenberger. Division Direc-

tor Jan Wescott manned the registration desk and greeted each guest as they checked in. Kathy and Richard's model railroad measures 12 x 16 feet and consists of three independent levels of 3-rail O-gauge track with also a 2-rail O-gauge line running on the upper level. Power is supplied to the trains via a classic Lionel dual-throttle power pack plus a recently added Lionel Trainmaster wireless control system. Another unique feature of the layout is its switch machines, which are operated by simple but reliable pneumatic pistons.

The layout represents the transitional period from steam to diesel in the late 1940s. Scenery includes both rural agricultural and urban settings. A complete American Flyer Circus is in full swing on the bottom level and an old fashioned rodeo was being staged on the mid-level.

A Circus Train pulled by and old-time American type 4-4-0 features livestock cars with elephants and giraffes that duck down at the tunnel portal tell-tales. Concealed speakers pipe in circus music to complete the effect.

Kathy and Richard's railroad is situated in a special room that was added to the home specifically for the layout. The walls of the layout room are beautifully decorated with railroad theme jig saw puzzles and other memorabilia that were mounted and framed. The backdrop for the layout is a stunning mural hand-painted directly to the wall by George Brugger of San Diego. Under the layout, custom display cases were installed to house extra rolling stock and locomotives.



Next on the tour was Doug Smelling's N-scale layout. Doug's layout measures 15 x 19 feet and takes up two-thirds of his garage. The layout is set up in block control with three mainline loops. Each loop measures between 60 and 80 feet. Trains are controlled by three tethered throttles, which are color coded for simplicity.

While not trying to model any particular right of way, Doug draws inspiration from locales from his youth and the Allegheny Mountains and tries to recreate them on his railroad. He models pre-CSX era and his stable includes lots of B&O and C&O motive power. There is a heavy emphasis on hauling freight and long coal drags. A large coal mining facility spans several tracks. The railway meanders through rolling hills and over waterways. One of the more exciting focal points is a scratch built 11"x38" trestle that spans a huge gorge.

Though the trains are up and running, at this point scenery is still under construction, which was great for visitors to see how it's done and gather valuable pointers and ideas. Doug removed a section of fascia from the side of the layout so visitors could inspect his bench work techniques and wiring.

Third stop on the tour was Charlie and Carol VanNetta's G-scale garden layout. Several members of the Las Vegas Garden Railway Society were on hand to help Charlie and Carol greet visitors to their impressive model railroad.

The VanNetta's garden railway is situated in a large back yard under the shade of several large trees. The railroad runs along three sides of a stone fence. Trains are operated by three cabs. Along the right of way, one can walk by a seaside village, a western town, and a mine complex. Carol has found that for structures on her garden railway, nothing holds up better under our Las Vegas sun than wooden "bird-house" buildings which can be found at any crafts fair. "They by far out-last expensive imported plastic kits." says Carol. "After spending days reinforcing and re-gluing the plastic ones, I discovered wood, and have never gone back."

The VanNetta garden railway serves as a favorite gathering place for L.V.G.S. members. Each November, Char-

lie and Carol hold an annual "Turkey Run" at their home, were visitors can bring over their own G-scale trains to operate and enjoy a turkey dinner.

Fourth stop on the tour was Frank Burke's HO-scale Tule Springs and Western. Frank's layout has been featured three times in *Railroad Model Craftsman* magazine over the years and it's no wonder when you see it. The attention to detail is fascinating.

The TS&W is a fictional railroad set somewhere in the Western United States shortly after W.W. II. Built in a 22x25 foot garage, the layout has 285 feet of mainline track, about half of it concealed, and a hidden 6-track holding yard. Scenery includes Tule Springs, a medium sized city with office buildings, hotels, shops and municipal structures. Several industries are located in the outlying areas with service spurs. There is a large locomotive facility that includes a yard, roundhouse and backshop for major repairs. An icing platform is nearby for servicing perishable freights. As you move into higher elevations, a mining complex comes into view.

They say that one of the great things about our hobby is that the enjoyment of modeling your railroad will never grow old, as you are never completely finished with it. The same can be said even of the Tule Springs and Western! Even with the passing of its founder Frank Burke, the TS&W trustees have dedicated themselves to the preservation and *expansion* of the layout. Today, modelers are busy adding a seaport scene to TS&W. Follow a rocky shoreline past a lighthouse to a drawbridge, which leads to a dock where a tugboat strains to hold a railway barge against its mooring.

The final stop on the Las Vegas West Layout Tour was the home of Brian and Loretta Block. Brian enjoys building structures and dioramas and entering them in contests. Brian has won many first-place and best of show awards, and his work has been featured in *Narrow Gauge and Shortline Gazette*.

Brian prefers to model in On3 because the larger size lends itself to more detail. He is building his layout in an unconventional way, constructing various scenes as dioramas and then combining them to create a model






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HISTORIAN'S CORNER

As reported in the last issue, our collection of past Order Boards is well on its way to completion. The first real issue we have dates back to the Summer of 1973 and is Volume 1, Number 2. The Number 1 issue was more or less a one page message. We have some missing issues in certain years but at this time we are trying to locate issues for those years we have nothing. We don't know if the Order Board was published in these years so we are asking your help in obtaining this information. If you know anything about these years, please pass the information on to us. Better still, if there were publications in any of these years, and you have a copy, we would like to get a copy of what you have. The years we have nothing for are: 1977 to 1982; 1988; 1990; 1992; 1994; 1997; and 1998. Your help will be greatly appreciated.

We have started a photo album of pictures taken at various Division events in the past. So far we have pictures from these past four events: Anaheim Meet, Coachella Valley Tours, Henderson Meet, and the Las Vegas West Layout Tour. If you have any photos you would like to contribute, we can copy what you have and return the original to you. If you have a scanner, computer and are on the Internet, you can digitize them and e-mail them to us.

More Trivia: Last issue we told you about the first Division organizational meeting held in 1973. Thanks to Don Oldendorf, a past Cajon Historian from the early years and Gary Stenberg, the original Editor of the Order Board and later the second Superintendent of the Cajon Division, we have these additional facts. The Cajon Division was originally know as Division 8, when the petition to form a new division was submitted to the PCR Board of Directors on April 27, 1973. At the June 24, 1973 Organizational meeting the Division name was officially changed to the Cajon Division. The first annual banquet was held at Knott's Berry Farm in Buena Park on February 23, 1974. At this meeting, the Cajon Division Emblem, prepared by R. B. Rogers of Colton, was submitted for approval and overwhelming approval was obtained. See this emblem below. Note that there is no engine in the center of the emblem as appears in today's

emblem. It was said that the scene depicted in the original emblem represented the AT&SF tracks at the Cajon Summit looking toward San Bernardino. More recently, of course, the scene was replaced with the locomotive as the emblem appears today. We have been told that the new emblem was designed by Vic Prior but we can not verify this fact. If anyone knows the true story about the change, we would appreciate hearing from you. Incidentally, the object of Division 8, as reported in the first CAJON-NEWSLETTER, was to "Make Model Railroading More Fun". More next time.
