

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
Las Vegas East Layout Tour

Almost sixty people turned out and all had a wonderful time on another successful Las Vegas Layout Tour.

Check in and first stop on the tour was at the home of Robert and Jan Wescott. Robert's HO scale New England & Western Railroad covers an area of 18 x 15 ½ feet. The freelance layout is set in New Haven

country in the 1930s to 1940s. While traveling the hilly New England countryside, trains will enter and exit various tunnel portals so many times that the observer has a hard time knowing where a train will appear next.



Next stop on the tour was Bob and Ladora Buck's G scale "Buckbored's

Railroad Company".
Bob's garden railway
is set in an 1880's
western mining
town. All the structures and trestles on
the layout are scratch
built. Several structures are replicas of
buildings found in



Edenville, Iowa, where Bob grew up. Trains can cover almost 400 feet of track powered by either transformer or onboard batteries. Control is via cordless remote control.


Staying with G scale, "tourists" were treated to a second garden railway at the home of Tom and Barbara Paolucci. Set in the American West between 1860 and 1890, the "Sunset Valley Railroad" operates on 500 feet of track, which includes two main lines and a



freight yard. Scenery includes tunnels, mountains, a pond with fish and a town. Tom and Barbara have decorated their layout with scratch built and commercial kit structures interspersed with live cactus. All the buildings are fully illuminated and a sound system provides authentic period music.

Fourth stop on the tour was the home of Dave Dunaway and his "Along Route 66 Railroad." Dave's layout portrays the 1950s transitional period on the Cajon Pass from San Bernardino to Summit in Califor-

nia. The layout surrounds the walls of a large 23 x 24-foot room on two levels. Recapturing a "railfan's paradise", visitors can view prime examples of UP, SP, and Santa Fe



power struggling through the grades of the Cajon. Most of the buildings are scratch built, including an impressive 20" turntable and 21-stall roundhouse.

Refreshments and snacks were on hand at each stop, but many attendees munched cautiously in anticipation of what laid ahead. The final stop on (Continued from page 3)

the tour was the home of Bill and Jane Jacobs, where hobbyists and railfans found a delicious barbecue dinner. With their guest's appetites unfettered, Bill and Jane were "shocked and awed" as three huge beef briskets, three dozen hot dogs and two large pot of beans were consumed. Host Bill Jacobs, echoing Dee Tucker's comments from the Barstow event remarked: "model railroaders sure can eat!"

Although currently Bill does not have an operating layout, visitors to his home still got to see a model railroad in action. Jan Wescott took the opportunity to debut her portable Lego Train layout! Jan's layout featured two running trains made out of Legos.

During the barbecue, Merit Awards were presented poolside by AP Chair Robert Wescott. (See RDC in this issue.) Director Jan Wescott distributed door prizes and presented a special honorary membership award to Ashley Merritt for all of her vol-

DIVISION VISITS GATX

On May 28th the Cajon Division was given the opportunity to visit the General American Transportation Co. (GATX) Railcar Repair Facility in Colton, CA. I know that a weekday tour is very difficult to attend for those who have to be at work, but it was the best time to see the plant in full operation. GATX does not operate on Saturdays or Sundays, still 26 of our members were able to join us. I have been associated with GATX for many years as the coordinator for the Anaheim Fire Dept. Hazardous Materials Team. My responsibilities include insuring that our Team's members maintain their skill levels for tank car emergencies. Our Haz-Mat Team has visited GATX on many occasions, and the people there have always been very gracious hosts; once again, GATX did not disappointment me. We were nearly given carte blanche by our tour guide Brian Noh, and I don't believe that any question went unanswered, any request went un-honored, nor was any opportunity missed. The people at GATX basically said, "What do you want to see, and what do you want to do? OK... let's do it!"

The tour was divided into two sessions, morning and afternoon, each group saw essentially the same things, but because we were in such a dynamic setting each group was also presented with unique opportunities. There were approximately 60 railcars in various stages of repair in the yard, and Brian let us "get our hands dirty," including climbing on any of the cars that we wished. Everyone got to see tank cars up close and personal; we saw the various exterior fittings, valves, and assemblies that make up a tank car as well as the plumbing on the inside. In addition, both groups got the chance to observe the inside slope sheets and off-loading gates of a covered hopper, how a railcar truck is disassembled, and a railcar repair facility in full swing. While we were investigating the details on a cut of auto racks, the conversation swung around to what a great layout room one of them would make.

The morning group spent more time in the shop building where the exterior of the cars are painted. While there, we got to watch a nice new coat of black paint being applied to a tank car, and take a ride on the transfer table. During the afternoon session, a switch crew brought in a new cut of cars for repair. We found a new remote control switch engine, so of course we just had to climb on and pretend to be the engineer. There was not much going on in the exterior paint shop during the afternoon, so we wandered over to the shop building where the interior of tank cars are lined and spent some time peering down into the man-ways; happily no one lost anything inside, which was Brian's biggest concern. Railfans being what we are, the afternoon group managed to find the bone yard and get some pictures of some very old switch engines and equipment. I heard some conversations about, "I wonder what they want for that?" and "I wonder if my wife would let me keep that in our back yard?"

It was hot, probably 90 in the afternoon, but well worth the sunburn I received. Despite the heat, I think that everyone had a good time. I also want to mention how great our members were, as gracious as our host was; our members were equally gracious guests. From an organizer's standpoint, this event went off without a hitch, and I want to thank everybody who attended for making my job so easy and fun. I also want to thank Jan Wescott and Chuck Nauman for their invaluable help in organizing this function. We truly have a Division to be proud of!


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

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Historian's Corner

Our collection of past issues of the Order Board is complete thanks to Dick Harley (a life member in Orange County) who will be sending us copies of those issues we are missing. So far we have 60 issues dating back to the number 2 issue in 1973 and Dick's will add about 20+ more. We offer one last big "thank you" to all those who contributed to our collection.

Trivia: "The Cajon Division and the Order Board." The first issue of what is now the Order Board was, in 1973, a one page letter simply called the "Division 8 Newsletter." As previously reported, the first organizational meeting of the PCR Cajon Division (called Division 8 at that time but changed to Cajon Division at this meeting) was held June 24, 1973 at Hunter Park in Riv-

erside. New officers were announced and Division events for the remainder of the year were scheduled thus setting the tone for future officers. Following that meeting the second issue of the Cajon Division publication, now known as the "Cajon-Newsletter" was published as the summer issue. In this issue was a request that suggestions for a more distinctive name for the newsletter be submitted to Bill Morriseau, Publications Committee Chairman. In the third Newsletter (Winter issue) ten names had been submitted and listed but one had not yet been selected. By the first issue of Volume 2, published in 1974, the Executive Committee had chosen the name Order Board and it appeared on the cover and has been ever since. The editor at this time was our old friend "Spike" (Gary Stenberg).



The Pacific Coast Region held its Annual Convention, April 23 – 27 this year, at the Crown Plaza Hotel, Pleasanton, CA. The venue was nice, but it did rain a lot. This was a full-function convention, minus any raffles or auctions.

There were numerous interesting clinics; I'll mention two. The first was a three-part treatment of model railroad photography, put on by a group of accomplished photogs, including a hands-on session followed by a critique of participants' efforts. The second was a demonstration of model trees and techniques for making them, by Bob Hundman, editor of three of those railroad mags subscribed to by some of us.

The model and diorama contests drew a reasonable number of entrants. Several of the models were quite impressive. The photo contest drew a somewhat limited number of entries, perhaps the reason that the Las Vegas contingent walked away with two firsts and two seconds, among the seven categories.

Outside activities included a large number of bayarea home layouts on self-guided tours. There really are some great modelers in California. Also, there were speeder rides along the 6 miles of trackage through Niles Canyon, just south of Pleasanton. Other activities at the hotel included an old-time railroad movie evening, a swap meet, the conventional Hobo Breakfast, and the Awards Banquet on the final night.

As far as I could tell this convention didn't have any glitches, other than the excess of rainy weather, apparently an anomaly. Next year the PCR Annual Convention will be held in the wine country of Napa, April 29 – May 2, sponsored by the Redwood Empire Division and the Napa Valley Model Railroad Historical Society. They have a really great looking Convention Car lined up: a prototypical pipe flat with large diameter steel pipe load, similar to that manufactured in Napa. No two cars will have the same road number!



After the introduction of new members and first time attendees; there were 9; the "Show and Tell" began. These little sessions have really turned into mini-clinics and are a lot of fun. Lynn Austin gave a really informative demonstration of why rolling stock should be tested using several test fixtures he has devised. Bill Jacobs displayed his HO baggage carts. John French, who, among other things, collects old kits, showed On30 and HO versions of Heinz pickle cars he has built, based on an old Strombecker kit that he has. Bob Mitchell demonstrated a way to build pine trees from balsa wood and aluminum screen wire. Based on the number of questions, Bob has developed a great, and I'll bet copied a lot, technique. Kathy Rice showed some of her collection of prototype car seals-some were really obscure. Finally, John McIntire displayed some On20 (that's O-scale on HOn3 track) scratch built rolling stock he constructed at least 35 years ago-it looked good even with today's technology. The Show and Tellers had a special door prize drawing and prizes were won by Kathy Rice, John French, and Bill Jacobs.

Then came the auction contest. Rather than just give away door prizes, the idea came to someone (Jan, I believe) to auction them off. Then why not have a contest to see who is the best auctioneer? All anybody knows about these prizes is the scale. Bob Mitchell won the contest, because he <u>really</u> did sound like an auctioneer, but Director Jan was heard to say that she was stunned by Brian Block's great showmanship. Not only did Bob win the contest, he donated the pine trees he had shown and they brought in the biggest amount of dollars in the auction.

During all the activities above, Ashley Merritt, our Division's only honorary member, was given the task of selling raffle tickets for the G-Scale Climax. Lynn had stipulated that at least \$300 worth of tickets had to be sold. Well, Ashley could sell ice to an Eskimo, as they say, and the raffle drawing was held with Jim Hinkle being the lucky winner.

The aroma of hamburgers began wafting through the yard, and Ed Hall, who had been dragooned into the position of chef of the day, was ready to go. The temperature was 104 at the time and Ed nearly swooned, but everybody mowed through burgers, baked beans, chips, cookies, and sodas. Then, after a little cleanup, it was off to the layout tour.

Fifty-four people officially signed in plus a few extra showed up for the afternoon's tour due to the mix-up on location. Layouts on the tour were Larry Dewnsup's HO Los Angeles & Salt Lake Railroad and Bob and Gwen Ketrenos' N-Scale layout. 
