If you weren't at the Cajon Event on April 17th, boy, did you miss a great day out with your fellow model railroaders! It was a beautiful day for a COVID safe outdoor gathering for the approximately 75 folks that came out to enjoy it! Registration was only \$10.00 and you got a raffle ticket for a chance to go home with one of two high quality prizes: an HO Steam Locomotive or an N Scale Steam locomotive.

This was our second outdoor-only event and we hope it will be our last under COVID restrictions, because we were not able to have clinics in the classrooms. Even so we did have a great time and attendees got to learn some useful information with the introduction of a new meet component called “Cajon Connect”, which was very well received. and a repeat of the popular “Modeler's Show and Tell” segment, which we introduced for the first time back in October.

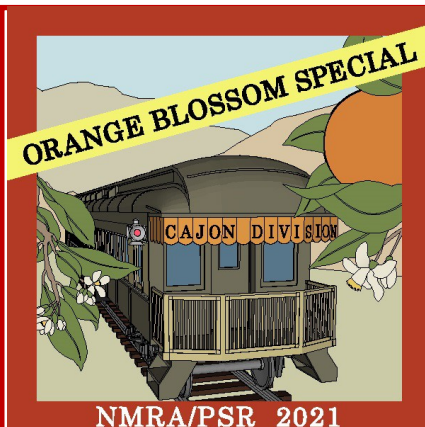
We started the day with very busy Swap Meet: 12 very excited venders, most of whom showed up well before we were ready for them! There was a wide variety of new, and not so new items on their tables at terrific prices and quite a bit of N scale, I was happy to see. Sales were brisk from 8 to 11.

We opened the Contest Room from 8 to 9:30 for attendees to view models brought in for Merit Award judging as well as for the “Modelers Show and Tell”. There were some very impressive models including a 2-foot square dock scene with multiple structures, finely scratch-built rolling stock, a kit-bashed locomotive and more. Judges spent a number of hours considering the models entered for Merit Award consideration with contest winners and Merit Awards presented during the Membership Meeting late in the day. Congratulations to Harold Helland, who not only received Merit Awards for models judged that morning, he also earned two Certificates of Achievement (one for Master Builder-Cars, the other for Model Railroad Engineer – Civil) which brought him very close to becoming a Master Model Railroader! Harold said he was very busy during his COVID isolation period! Now that's making lemonade out of lemons!

The “Modeler Show and Tell” was well received and to make it more informative to the audience and a little less intimidating for the presenters, we provided each modeler with a cue card of key subjects to talk about during their 3–4-minute presentation. If you have never done it, take my word for it that talking without a script for 3-4 minutes straight (and staying on point) is no easy feat, even if you are talking about something you are passionate about. The cue cards reminded presenters to cover subjects like: “what is it a model of”, “why did I build this model”, “what were the major challenges” and “what did you learn from the effort”.

Far and away the most enjoyable and educational segment of the day was the introduction of the “Cajon Connect” discussion groups. Originally conceived as an online opportunity for

Critical Registration Information Please Read

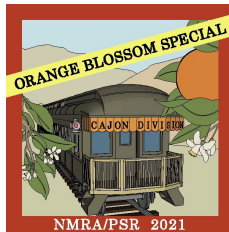

A page will be made available in the near future for you to sign up and bring your diorama.

So, what is a one-foot challenge?

A fun way to show off your creativity and modeling skills, and yes there are a few rules. And face it you will probably still be somewhat restricted in the next few months so use the time at home to build something fun. It will take your mind off of all the drama.

RULES

- The diorama must be a square 12 inches by 12 inches.
- The diorama can be any scale, any era, and any theme.
- The diorama must be railroad-related and must include a railroad track of any length.
- The diorama must have a flat bottom, stand on its own, be easily moved and nothing can overhang the edge.
- You must be a member of the NMRA.

And the diorama must be new and not have been entered in any previous contest.

JUDGING

Judging will be by popular vote of members attending the convention. Remember, the WOW factor plays a big part in getting votes.

PRIZES

Yes, there will be first, second, and third place cash prizes: \$50, \$30, and \$20.

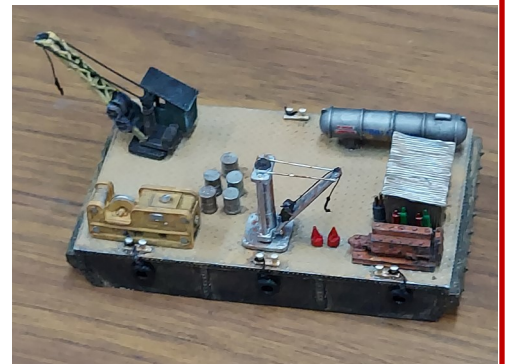
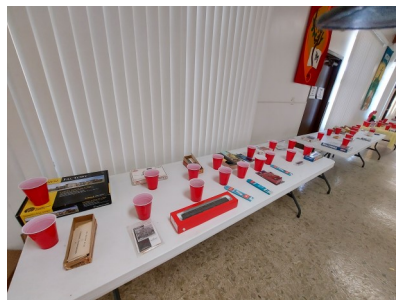

Yellow Pine Mining Co. Work Train received third place in the Popular Choice Loco & Rolling Stock. (See below for more photos.)

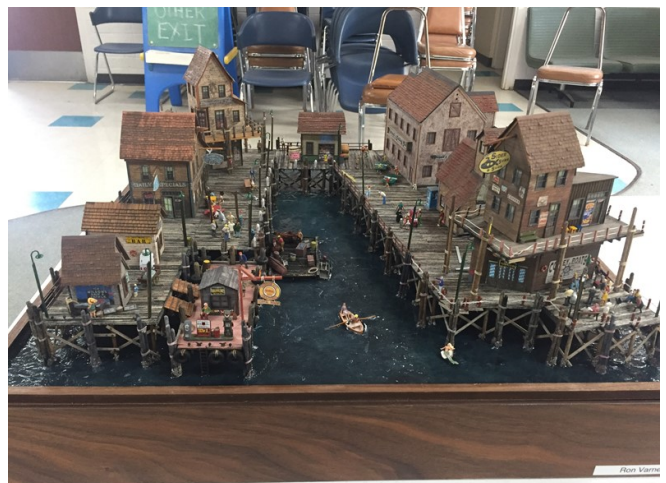


Harold Helland's (Cajon Div.) Steve's Building Shop (HO) in the judged category Structures received second place and second place in the Popular Choice Structures

Ron Varnell's (LA Div.) Westside Pier (HO) received first place in Peoples Choice Structures as well as Most Humorous/Clever



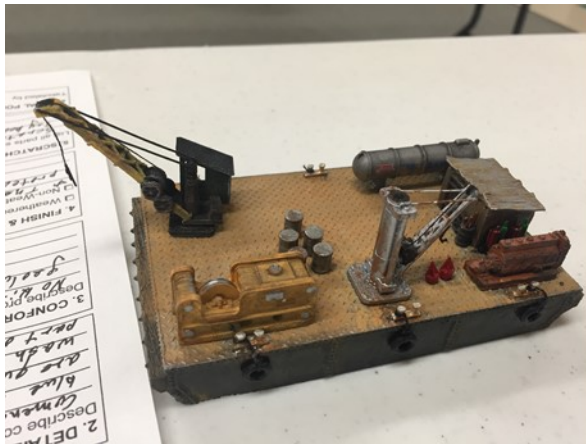

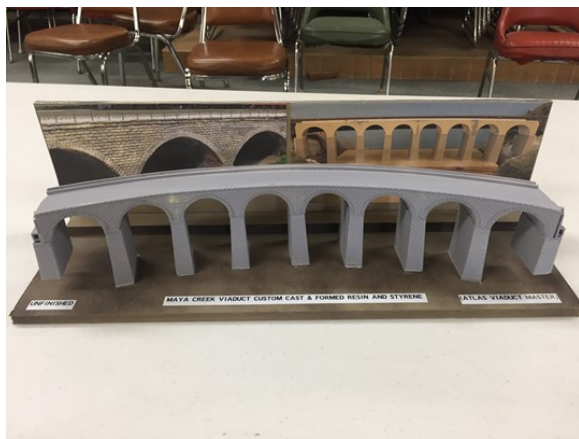

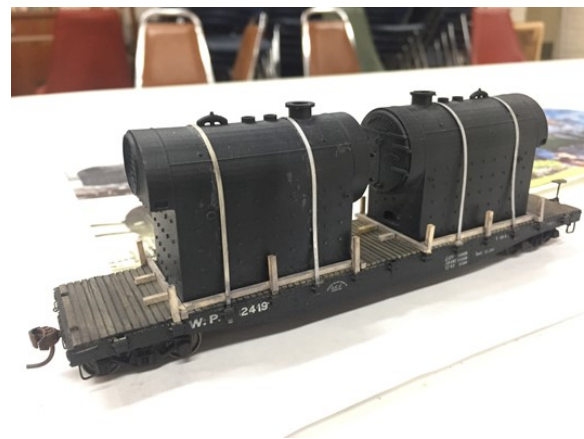

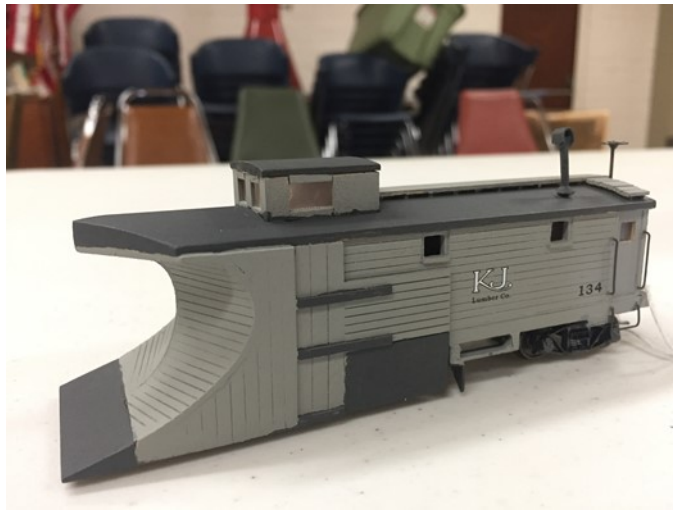

Miniatur Wunderland / Miniature Wonderland A Model Railroad Dream in Hamburg, Germany

Back in 2014 I took my daughter on a train trip through Europe and one of the absolute requirements from me was to visit *Miniatur Wunderland* in Hamburg. We allocated one full day to the visit and that was not at all enough. If (when) you go plan for at least two days.

I first heard about this layout at a clinic at an NMRA Convention (I think it was in Atlanta). The presenter shared his pictures and experiences and I will pass these two on: Stay at Hotel Fürst Bismarck (Count Bismarck – which is temporarily closed as so many other places right now) across the street from the main train station, AND book your tickets in advance – you get to skip an hour-long line of visitors trying to get in! And you should also book your behind-the-scenes tour, it's a must!

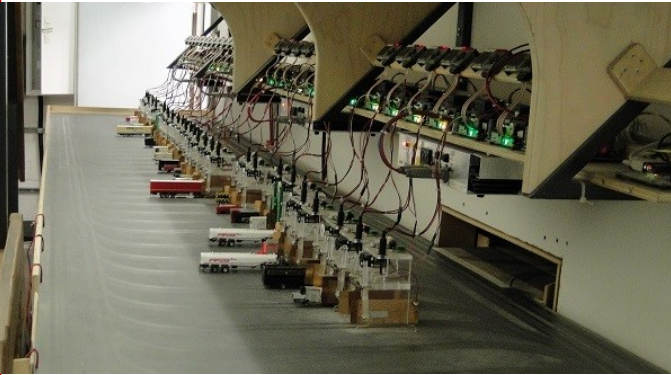


Once you are there the first impression is “This is BIG!” It is a third of an acre (16,000 square feet) today but it was a bit smaller back in 2014; they are constantly expanding the layout). There are 96 miles of track, 1,040 trains, 260,000 little people and they have spent 760,000 hours building it so far. Take a look at their web page <https://www.miniaturwunderland.com/> for more interesting facts and future plans.

Much (most) of the layout is fully automated. It's controlled from a large dispatcher area out in front for everyone to see.



The big trucks that drive along the highways do go to have their batteries recharged when the system deems it necessary. The only part that wasn't automated then (but is getting close to become so now) are the ships



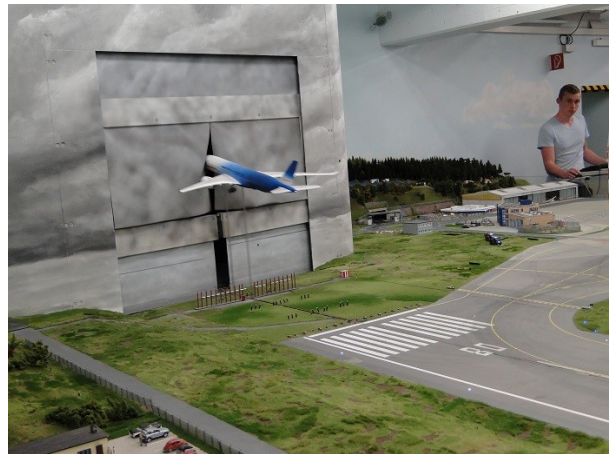
sailing on their ponds; these are radio controlled by an operator hiding behind a screen in the harbor. See <https://www.miniatur-wunderland.com/discover-wunderland/technologies/ship-control-system/> for the plans for a fully automated ship control system.



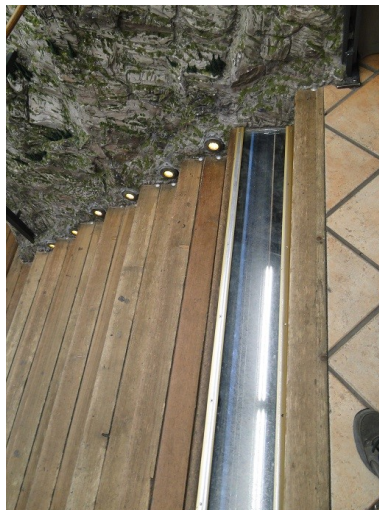
I mentioned 260,000 people on the layout. Everywhere you turn you see them. Outdoor music festival or a soccer game, are just two examples of this. Or look at all the taxi cabs waiting for passengers at the airport, most of them with working head and tail lights.



Speaking of the airport. The Knuffingen airport is a marvel in itself. They have designed a system where the airplanes take off and land (250 times a day). They didn't want pictures taken of the mechanism but the result is stunning. The most popular flying device (at least with the younger audience) is the bee. It didn't fly when I was there so I had to make do with a picture of it I found in the restaurant.



The layout is divided into several areas, such as USA, Switzerland, different parts of Germany, etc. An interesting way to connect areas is where they run the track inside a step on one of the stairways something some of us may be able to duplicate.



The USA area shows their free interpretation of real life, or how about a train bridge across the Grand Canyon tunnel where there isn't one, but who can resist a name like Zzyzx, or a space shuttle launch

Der Amerika Abschnitt wurde 2003 nach elf Monaten Bauzeit eröffnet und ist mit 100 qm nur halb so groß wie der bereits fertiggestellte Hamburg Abschnitt. Der Sehtunnel dagegen steht er diesem jedoch in keiner Weise nach. Die beiden Abschnitte sind durch einen gläsernen Tunnel miteinander verbunden. Ein absolutes Highlight ist Las Vegas, dessen Lichtermeer vor allem in den Nachtstunden beeindruckend anstrahlt. Rund ein Zehntel aller Wunderland-Lichter sind hier installiert - über 13.000 LEDs. Auch der Grand Canyon mit seinen tiefen Schluchten und atemberaubenden Felsformationen sollte man sich anschauen und vielleicht entdeckt der ein oder andere Besucher ja auch das geheimnisvolle Area 51 im südlichen Nevada.

reach the areas in the middle of the layout". Of course they have an answer for that too. Think

of an ironing board that is recessed in to a wall, flip it down fold it out, note the two supports that are built in to the city scene and

you have a surface that you can crawl out on and reach any point of the layout. This is also something else that we can use at home, maybe.



After a full day of walking around you will get hungry. There is a restaurant on site and here is my last tip: Locate the out-of-the-way smaller dining area. It was completely empty when we were there at the same time as the main dining area was packed with guests. As a bonus you get to sit in a train seat, which our traveling companion, Eeyore the Globetrotter, really appreciated. It's not easy to pick a few pictures for the newsletter out of the almost 300 I took but I hope that you have

gotten a taste of awaits you when you visit Minuatur Wunderland. *Per Harwe*
